Honoring Mrs. Porter

In December 2014, Mrs. Dori Porter retired after serving for nearly 30 years in the Criminal Justice Studies Program. From 1986 until 2006, Mrs. Porter worked alongside Dr. Susette Talarico as the Criminal Justice Studies' office manager and administrative specialist, playing a pivotal role in the successful growth of this interdisciplinary degree program.

In 2006, Mrs. Porter assumed the position of internship coordinator. Over the next nine years, she would work with 700-plus students on internship placements that provide a capstone experience and a strong foundation for a post-graduate career. Her perseverance and sense of optimism fostered strong institutional ties with officials in sponsoring agencies.

Perceptive and patient, Mrs. Porter provided individualized guidance to each student through

the internship placement process. She continued to stay in touch with students long after they graduated from the program, sending notes of encouragement and congratulations to criminal justice alumni.

In post-graduation assessments of the Program, criminal justice majors have made a point to write in comments saying "thank you, Mrs. Porter" for her support and assistance. In recognition of her service, an anonymous donor has made an initial gift to establish the Dori Porter Fund for Professional Development at the University of Georgia. If the fund meets a threshold level, awards will be made to provide internship stipends for students, cover costs to conduct professional development workshops, including networking events.

Professor Victor Rios delivered the 6th annual lecture on March 3rd, 2015. A former gang member who later became a gang prevention counselor, Rios earned his PhD from UC-Berkeley before joining the faculty at UC-Santa Barbara. His talk focused on the role of juvenile crime policies in shaping the lives of urban youth.





Susette M. Talarico public service leadership award

Senior Keller Shepard received the Talarico public service leadership award for 2015. This award and the lecture are supported by the Susette M. Talarico fund, established by Dr. T's former students, family, and friends. From 1984-2006, Dr. Talarico served as director of the CJSP. Known for her innovative approach to teaching and mentoring, she served as the driving force in the development of the criminal justice degree. Keller was recognized for his efforts in contributing to the Athens community.



Blasingame Scholars In '14, the Program received a \$10,000 donation from the Society of Former Agents of the FBI in memory of Jim Blasingame, a former FBI agent who served over 32 years, including SAC in the Atlanta office. This donation, made to the James T. Morris Fund, permitted the award of ten scholarship stipends to students. Six recipients above are pictured alongside Mrs. Alma Blasingame, William Hinshaw, and Ron Webb. The average GPA for the Blasingame scholars selected for 2015-2016 is over 3.5. Their internship plans are far-ranging, to include the GBI, the USDOJ, state probation, public defender, district attorney, and ACC Police Department.
